### Dear Citizens of Cornish:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty; I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.

Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

#### Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.

I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236<sup>th</sup> consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

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Dear Friends of Comish,

Since being swom into the Senate in 2013, I have made it my mission to address at the federal level the most important issues facing our great state. Working closely with my colleagues in the Maine Congressional Delegation, we've been able to successfully secure a number of legislative victories that support our state's economy, our rich traditions, and the hardworking people I am proud to represent.

In an increasingly polarized Congress, my goal as an Independent is to put partisanship flaide, build consensus and further common-sense solutions to address the needs of the American people. To this end, I have co-founded the Former Governoes Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.

One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students faced a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government.

Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 beought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement – including the Drug Enforcement Agency – to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their divention. Together, Senator Collins and I belped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada.

While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's focust industry in the wake of several mall closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingensity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignize Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.

County of York Commissioners Office

The County has experienced many successes over the past year most notably:

- The establishment of a County Animal Response Team which brought in a new wave of volunteers to EMA and Community 1st responders. The York County team is now the strongest team in Maine.
- The Establishment of a 'first in the nation' Family Emergency Preparedness course in Conjunction with the Biddeford and North Berwick school Districts, whereby the students received lessons over a 6-week period which were taught by High School students who received community service credits for teaching the younger students.
- The Acquisition of a UAV (Drone) for use by our Emergency Management Agency along with a newly formed team of pilots and camera operators have been put in place for search and rescue missions.
- Upgrading the County's emergency response network to RAVE. RAVE replaces Code Red and has the capability to be deployed to the local level. This will increase the public's alertness and response during times of emergency.
- The County is committed to recognizing community service and held the first Spirit of America awards ceremony in November where we recognized five citizens and one group for their commitment to their communities and volunteerism.
- A new partnership with Partners for a Hunger Free York County and YCSPi (York County Shelter Programs on the reuse and expansion of services at the former York County Food Rescue building.

The County also has its work cut in the year ahead as we attempt to mitigate the Tax impact of the Judicial System's decision to move and consolidate all courthouses to the City of Biddeford. We will need support from the Towns and their residents to present a united front, to aid the County in fighting this issue to save York County Taxpayers a substantial yearly increase in taxes.

### **CORNISH WATER DISTRICT – 2016 TOWN REPORT**

### TO THE CITIZENS OF CORNISH:

The Cornish Water District is a quasi-municipal non-profit corporation managed by an elected board of five trustees. We supplied 22,314,715 gallons of water during 2016 from both of our pump stations (Northwood Drive and Pavilion Road). In 2016 we pumped, on average, 61,136 gallons of water on a daily basis. The annual comprehensive tests done by the State of Maine laboratory indicated excellent drinking water quality.

In 2016 the Water District worked on or completed the following:

- 1. CCR (Consumer Confidence Report) was completed, published & distributed to consumers in July. The MDWP mandates this be done each year.
- 2. Flushed all hydrants & blow offs.
- 3. Exercised all system gate valves.
- 4. Completed quarterly bacteria tests required by Maine State Drinking Water Program. (0 contaminates were found).
- 5. Cleared 2 service line freeze ups.
- 6. Installed 4 new water service lines.
- 7. Repaired 5 service line leaks.
- 8. Repaired and replaced 5 curb stops & curb stop boxes.
- 9. Installed 20 new meters, replacing outdated meters.
- 10. Installed 20 winter bleeder systems to prevent freeze ups.
- 11. Updated the vulnerability assessment and emergency response plan as required.
- 12. Continued updating the building and security measures in accordance with homeland security completing fencing around exterior of building & installing security cameras.
- 13. Completed necessary training classes to keep our Operator Licenses up to date.
- 14. Implemented & enforced Cross Connection Control Program with annual inspection. Reporting 100% compliance & working backflows.
- 15. Jim Taylor completed training to become certified backflow inspector.
- 16. New water meter fitted at Northwood pump station.
- 17. Chemical pump and fuse box updated at Northwood pump station.
- 18. New seals, diaphragms & pipes fitted to all chemical pipes.
- 19. New gauges & pipe filters fitted for both Pavilion Rd and Northwood pumping stations.
- 20. New sheetrock and splash guards in chemical room at Pavilion Road.
- 21. Passed sanitary exam given by State of Maine.
- 22. New roof and insulation fitted to the reservoir building
- 23. New overflow pipe and sanitary flap fitted at reservoir.
- 24. New lift station at Pavilion Road.
- 25. Raised several gate valve boxes for DOT paving project on Route 5.
- 26. Raised fire hydrant at Moulton Lumber 6".
- 27. Updated hydrant flow testing.
- 28. Updated the water main system map.
- 29. New safety equipment for staff.
- 30. New tools, holder & safety cones for truck.
- 31. Trench box updated (new end panels, legs & lifting sling).
- 32. Updated billing software & computers.

## 2016 Recycling Update

The Cornish Recycling Center, located on School Street, accepts plastics #1 - #7 (bottles, jugs, tubs), tin and aluminum cans, all paper (junk mail, catalogues, magazines), paperboard (cereal boxes or cardboard tubes), glass bottles and jars as well as broken down cardboard boxes.

In 2016, the Cornish Recycling Center collected 48.55 tons (97,100 pounds) of material. This is a 5.7% decrease from our 2015 recycling rate.

Per EcoMaine, the 2016 Cornish recycling stream breaks down into the following categories:

EcoMaine explained that there is a difference in the total tons we recycled vs. breakdown above due in part to moisture content in material at time of acceptance.

#### SACO RIVER CORRIDOR COMMISSION

"Communities Working Together To Protect Our Rivers"

The Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) works to protect the Ossipee, Little Ossipee and the Saco River through the standards, programs and laws described by the Saco River Corridor Act. The Maine legislature created a set of standards to protect these great rivers after many citizens in the 20 surrounding towns approached them for help. Each of these 20 towns has an opportunity to be represented on the Commission by having the town appoint two people – a member and an alternate.

The Town of Comish is fortunate to have Jack Bash and Jennifer Otenti on the Commission. In a practical sense, Commissioners give the Town of Comish an opportunity to participate in the present and future development patterns throughout the entire corridor from Fryeburg to Saco. The Commission looks at land use issues, water quality and conservation issues covering a wide range of topics during the year. Clean, healthy water is Maine's greatest asset. It's hard to understate this important fact.

We are happy to report the conclusion of our sixteenth successful Saco River Monitoring Program. Currently, we have over 10 volunteers monitoring for dissolved oxygen, pH, turbidity, temperature, total Kjeldahl nitrogen, total phosphorus, orthophosphate, Alkalinity and Escherichia coli. We also do macro invertebrate testing and conductivity testing at many sites within the corridor. Our testing takes place on a bi-weekly schedule along the Saco, Ossipee, and Little Ossipee Rivers at 35 different locations during the months of May through September. All of the information relating to the past sixteen years of the Commission's monitoring program can be found on our website located at www.srcc-maine.org. This information can be useful for Planning Boards, Code Enforcement Officers and developers in locating appropriate types of land uses close to the River.

The Commission works hard to keep the rivers clean and healthy, but they cannot do it alone. Copies of the water quality monitoring information is available or questions can be asked by calling Dennis, the Commission's Executive Director. The Commission office is located at 81 Maple Street in Cornish, Maine (Telephone 207-625-8123) and can be found on the web at www.srcc-maine.org.

## **Sacopee Valley Recreation Council Annual Report**

For over twenty years the Sacopee Valley Recreation Council has provided a wide variety of programs for members of the communities in the area. The council conducts business through a board of directors who are volunteers and two paid part time program coordinators. Many of the programs are conducted by volunteers as well, but there are some paid positions especially for summer camps.

The traditional sports programs for youth from grade K-6 include baseball, softball, field hockey, soccer, and basketball. Our summer camps are always very popular as well.

We try to offer activities for the whole family such as cross country skiing on Sundays and Open Gym on Saturdays and the annual Barn Dance in March. The ice rink provides skating in the winter and gets a lot of use when the weather permits. There are also programs for adults including women's gym night and cribbage. A learn to skate program was run by students during the winter months for the fifth time this past year.

None of these things would be possible without the help and support of the citizens of the five towns we serve. We would be happy to have more people join the council or get involved in some way; be it refereeing, coaching, helping at dances, offering new programs, or helping organize equipment. Volunteers are always needed.

SVRC is now a 501©3(a registered non-profit). We continue to lease the Horizons Building and must pay the heat and lights for that. Liability insurance, advertising, and equipment costs are always increasing and our fundraising through dances and other events help to keep the cost of programs down for the participants. Even so, most programs do still need to charge a fee.

We would like to thank everyone for their help this past year and we look forward to another great year of programs for community members of all ages. If you have any suggestions or ideas, please get involved and help make the program even better.

As of January 2017 we are running the department with a roster of 15-20, although our average is only 5-6 members a call which is minimal at best!! As always we are looking for new members.

Once again Thank you to the Selectmen and towns people for the continued support, for without it we couldn't do our jobs.

### BONNEY MEMORIAL LIBRARY 2016 REPORT

During our 2015-2016 fiscal year (November 1 through October 31) the Library had 8075 people visited, and 10,641books, magazines, and audio-visual materials were circulated. There were 478 books and 8 audiovisual items purchased, while 443 books, audio CD's and DVD's were donated. On site, there were 2312 users of our in-house computers, and many outside access to our 24-hour wireless services.

The Library fulfilled 630 interlibrary loan book and audio-visual requests for our patrons from libraries in Maine and other states, and 126 books from our own collection were lent to other Maine libraries.

Among programs offered during the year, the Library continued its successful "Family Story Time" for children up to five years old, and "Lego Adventure" and "Treehouse Club" for older children. Adults were offered various programs to participate in - Bonney Readers monthly book club, Adult Coloring Books, spoken French class, Maine Humanities "Let's Talk About It" discussion series titled Defining Wilderness: Defining Maine. The Library held special one time programs for children and adults - Discovering Butterflies and Bugs, The Adventures of Fly Fishing with Dan Bonville, Iceland Dinner & Presentation, and reading of The Polar Express during Christmas in Cornish.

Friends of Bonney Memorial Library, a volunteer group, continued its mission to "raise funds to supplement library service, promote the library as a community center, and advocate for the current and future needs of the library." Among its year's events were two Book and Pie Sales held in May and October and our annual CookieFest. The library continues to be an information center for the talking book program which serves the blind and physically handicapped; and to participate in Tax Forms Outlet Program that allows the library to provide federal tax forms to our patrons.

This year's income from bequests and stocks, fundraising events, donations and \$12,000 Town support was \$51,151. This provided for our Library Director's salary, building maintenance and repairs, administrative expenses – heat, insurance, water, and miscellaneous costs.

The Library Expansion Committee had heat pumps, LED lighting and cellular window shades installed in the present building and the furnace removed to prepare for installation of an elevator and ADA accessible bathroom; it has developed plans for a 20 solar panel array to be installed off-site; and it is soliciting contributions from individuals and Maine foundations so that the renovation of the current building and construction of an addition can start in February 2017.

After 88 years, Bonney Memorial Library looks ahead to further decades of service to all those who, as Dr. Bonney said, "care to read and learn."

Re: Franchise fees from Time Warner Cable

We are writing to request that the article below be included in the warrant for the next town meeting (2017) and request 100% of franchise fees received from Time Warner Cable.

This year has been an exciting and refreshing one for the student managed TV-2 program. We continue to add an extensive amount of updated programming for our viewers across the MSAD55 community. We have continued to provide programming to those not served by Time Warner Cable by use of streaming web media content. Our USTREAM site allows viewers who do not have access to TV2 on their televisions to view the same content online simultaneously. By simply going to our website www.sad55.org/tv2, anyone can view our live programming 24/7. Again this year, SVHS students continue to work particularly hard setting up live sound and live remote broadcasting from the many school board public forums that took place during the school budget process, as well as other community and school events. We were able to broadcast many different sporting events from Sacopee Valley High School that included baseball, football, soccer, and field hockey. Currently, we are able to stream live basketball games during the season both boys and girls varsity teams on Tv2 and our website. We continue to provide coverage of all school board meetings and were able to record and broadcast all of the town meetings. Every day at 7am and 7pm we broadcast the entire MSAD55 School Board Meeting from the past month so viewers can catch up if they missed the event. We also broadcasted many town events during the past year and will continue to increase the amount of events we cover in the towns that support TV2.

TV-2 students continue to work in a classroom format perfecting their skills with these many events, processing school and community events, and updating information on our bulletin board for viewers. Students are actively engaged in learning valuable real life TV/Video experiences as they develop skills necessary to manage the public access channel, all usually while broadcasting, "on-the-fly". We are very proud to have provided coverage of SVHS sporting events this past year, including school events, and look to always improve on the program. Many students benefit from this educational component created by the TV-2 Community Television Program in the school, several of which have pursued careers in this discipline after graduation. Students are proud to have been able to provide this service to the community of MSAD #55 and the 5 towns. The students should be commended for their hard work, long hours and skills. For most students in the program, it is their first time broadcasting events and quickly learn the skills required for the job.

The TV-2 Committee, in cooperation with town officials negotiated a new 10 Year Franchise Agreement with Time Warner Cable. The Franchise Negotiations Committee had been working with several outside organizations, to include the "Broadband Expansion Initiative", to explore expanded coverage to the people of all five towns. Time Warner has recently expanded coverage to several areas of the five towns as part of the "ConnectME" grants. As the new agreement was reached, it serves to settle outstanding issues and will provide equipment & facility improvements to facilitate expansion for residents and improvements to our current coverage even further, to include a web interface. We have come to a successful conclusion in that process. In 2017 we will see the results of our franchise agreement negotiations for a solid resolution and new 10-year agreement in place. The grant funds received have enhanced the ability to provide HD broadcasting signals, audio enhancements, bringing old equipment & cameras up do date, provide a much clearer signal and more access to web capabilities, all things that have previously been a struggle. The equipment grants have placed the TV2 station in line with the infrastructure to enhance our current operations. We look forward to continuing to reach more viewers, provide more event coverage and further expand on our current broadcasting service.

This article does not require the town to raise any revenue. The franchise fee is a fee paid by each cable subscriber to Time Warner Cable - above and beyond the regular cable rate - and is returned to the towns. Most municipalities dedicate these fees to the local access station, in our case TV-2. It is our goal to have TV-2 be self-sufficient, and not need to use school funds or request donations from local businesses to maintain operations.

All funds for TV-2 are managed through the MSAD #55 Finance Office and are audited every year with records kept for at least seven years.

To the Budget Committee - Town of Comish

January 5, 2017

As in previous years, the Cornish Historical Society is requesting \$3000 in support from the Town.

Cornish Historical Society has approximately 60 current dues paying members. This year we published three newsletters, which were mailed to some members, emailed to those who request this, and copies were also available at the Library.

We had three major fundraising activities: the Duck Derby in April, the vintage base ball tournament, and the sale of our annual calendar. We also had two bake sales: at the June Primary, and November Elections. These were shared with the Comish Fairgrounds Committee to assist with both groups' funding.

We thank the Library for the generous use of the first floor of 40 Main Street, where we have a lease. There are the usual expenses of electricity, water, sewer and insurance. There are charges for turning the water on in the Spring and off before freezing weather. We contribute to the Library's expenses of snow removal. We have completed several weatherization projects to make the first floor more energy efficient, but still do not feel it is practical to have the building heated fully; we hope to expand its use in "cool" weather though.

In 2016 our museum and research room were open seasonally one afternoon per week, staffed by volunteer members. We have put considerable effort into organizing the materials we have, and are still working on archival storage for the future. We are also open to the public by appointment. Volunteers averaged 2-3 queries per month from locals and visitors, to assist with their historical questions, without charge.

Programs and activities in 2006: Colonial Herbal Medicine, Duck Derby, Vintage Base Ball Festival, Apple Festival, and historical traditions at "Christmas in Cornish" focused on children. A new exhibit "Clothing Manufacturing in Cornish" was installed and a public program was given re: the Cornish Dress Factory. Another free program given was on genealogy, "Finding Your Farnity". We provided historical research and materials for the Hilbide Church's organ rededication, and volunteer speakers; this was a very significant community event. We hope these events reflect well upon our Town and also bring some new visitors and business to our merchants.

The Boston Post Cane is now displayed in a beautiful case with each recipient's name since 1909 engraved individually on brass namegiates. The Historical Society has paid for all of that. The research to update and connect this list required several months of volunteers' research. We also hooted the presentation of the 2016 recipient at our building and supplied the certificate and commemorative pin to the family, and photos and DVD of the ceremony. The Selectmen have asked us to attain again with the next recipient, which we have agreed to do.

We will continue our mission for student involvement, and providing historically important service to our town. In 2017 we will provide a plaque for the old Cornish School bell which is now in Thompson Park, and an explanatory plaque and marker behind Pake Hall no: the Old Cemeters.

We always welcome new members to our monthly meetings and hope to continue to be a resource for the Town of Cornish.

We are proud of two of our biggest accomplishments this year. We funded materials for the construction of the case for Cornish's Boston Post Cane, built by Wes Sunderland, and we gathered information to compile an accurate list of past recipients. The cane is now on display at 40 Main St. and will eventually be moved to Pike Hall.

We received CDBG funds from the town of Cornish, which were used to conduct an energy audit of our building, improve the heating system, install outdoor solar powered lighting, new storm windows on the first floor, and general weatherization. Work on the porch will continue in the spring, creating an attractive and usable space for activities. This will also include new nailings to improve safe access.

We sent: three newsletters to members, also available at the library, and published our annual fund-raising calendar. Museum, including research room, was open seasonally on Saturdays 11- 4 and by appointment.

Cornish Historical Society has monthly meetings and welcomes new members, suggestions for programs and activities, and the loan or donation of Cornish memorabilia. We thank the Bonney Memorial Library for the use of their building and the town of Cornish for its continued support.
