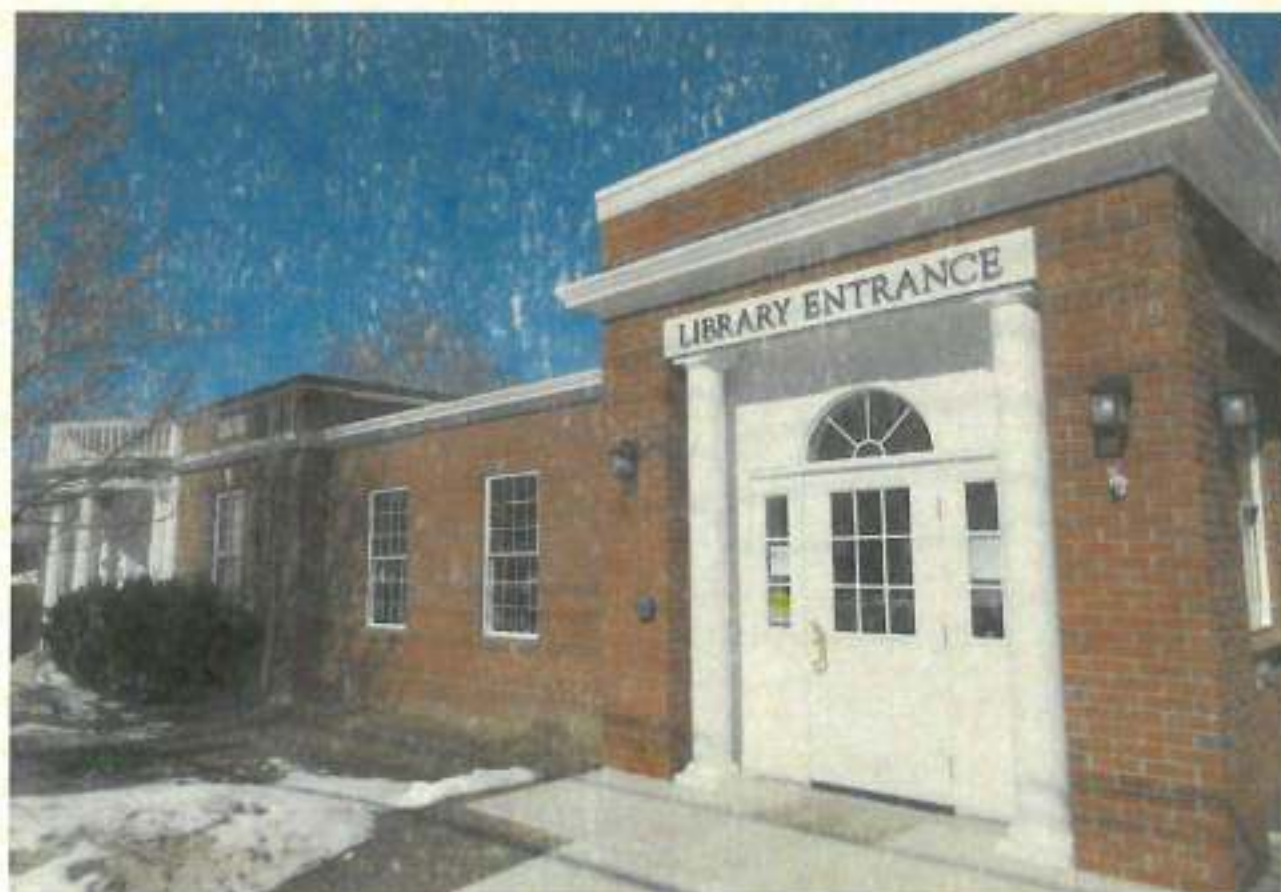

The Moderator will not entertain public comment about specific individuals.

The Moderator has the right to set a time limit for comments. Be prepared to state your business in a brief and concise manner.

During a Public Meeting, only the subject matter can be discussed.

Comments should always be courteous. Personal and accusatory comments are out of order. Profanity, disorderly language or gestures at meetings are prohibited.

At no time will the public be allowed to argue, debate or introduce a topic that is not on the agenda.

During discussion, the audience shall not disturb the proceedings by whispering, talking or other distractions

Dear Citizen of Cornish:

For the past seven years as your Governor, my priority has been to make Maine—our people—prosper. Helping you keep more money in your wallet by reducing taxes has been part of that mission.

Too many Maine families are facing skyrocketing property taxes that strain household budgets. Our elderly on fixed incomes are particularly vulnerable to these increases. School budgets are often blamed for annual increases in property taxes. But there's another reason: A tremendous amount of land and property value has been taken off the tax rolls, leaving homeowners to pick up the tab.

As of 2016, towns and cities owned land and buildings valued at nearly \$5.5 billion statewide. Large and wealthy non-profits, such as hospitals and colleges, often escape paying property taxes on their vast real estate holdings—totaling more than \$5.1 billion statewide.

In Maine, nearly 2.5 million acres of land have been set aside for conservation by the federal and state governments and non-profit organizations, including land trusts. Municipalities are losing out on property taxes on an estimated \$2 billion in land that has been either removed from the tax rolls or prohibited from development—shifting the cost of municipal services to local homeowners through higher property taxes.

It's time to recognize the results of taking property off the tax rolls and identify solutions to reduce the burden on our homeowners. My administration's proposals have been met with staunch resistance.

In 1993, about 35,800 acres of land were documented as land-trust owned. That number has increased by an astonishing 1,270 percent. Land trusts now control over 490,000 acres with an estimated value of \$403 million. We must restore the balance. We will be working this session to ensure all land owners are contributing to the local tax base. It's time for them to pay their fair share.

I encourage you to ask your local officials how much land in your municipality has been taken off the tax rolls, as well as how much in tax revenue that land would have been contributing today to offset your property taxes.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

Maine has the oldest average age in the nation. As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities for the Committee are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security. Following the Committee's investigation into skyrocketing prescription drug costs, I authored bipartisan legislation to foster generic competition, which was signed into law. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for seniors to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. To support the 40 million family caregivers in the United States, I am proud to have authored the RAISE Family Caregivers Act to create a coordinated strategy to support family members who make countless personal and financial sacrifices to care for their loved ones.

The opioid crisis touches families and communities across our state. As a member of the Appropriations Committee, I fought for significant increases in funding to support community, law-enforcement, and public health efforts. In April, the State of Maine was awarded over \$2 million to fight this devastating public health crisis. Additionally, I have authored legislation to support grandparents and other extended family members who are raising grandchildren as a result of the nation's opioid epidemic.

Biomedical research has the potential to improve and save lives, and also supports good jobs at research facilities here in Maine. Last year, the Appropriations Committee approved a \$2 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health for the third consecutive year. This includes an increase of nearly 30 percent for research on Alzheimer's, our nation's most costly disease. As founder and co-chair of the Senate Diabetes Caucus, I work to raise awareness of the threats posed by diabetes, invest in research, and improve access to treatment options. My bill to establish a national commission of health care experts on diabetes care and prevention was signed into law in 2017.

We owe our veterans so much. Last year, I worked to secure the authorization of a Community-Based Outpatient Clinic in Portland to support the health care of Maine's veterans in the southern part of our state. I also worked to secure funding extensions to help veterans throughout rural Maine receive health care within their communities. I also worked to secure funding for housing vouchers for veterans to reduce veterans' homelessness.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard for construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen our national security and preserve great jobs in our state.

As chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I worked to increase funding for the TIGER program that has provided Maine with more than \$122 million for vital transportation projects. For housing, I worked to provide \$160 million to help communities protect children from the harmful effects of lead poisoning.

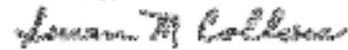
Growing our economy remains a top priority. I supported the comprehensive tax reform bill because it will help lower- and middle-income families keep more of their hard-earned money; boost the economy; and encourage businesses, both small and large, to grow and create jobs here in Maine and around the country. This legislation contains key provisions I authored that are important to Mainers, including preserving the deduction

for state and local taxes, expanding the deduction for medical expenses, and enabling public employees such as firefighters, teachers, and police officers, as well as clergy and employees of nonprofits, to make "catch-up" contributions to their retirement accounts. I had the effort to ensure that the tax cut will not trigger automatic budget cuts to Medicare or any other programs.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unaposted work ethic. As of December 2017, I have cast more than 5,500 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends,

Representing Maine in the United States Senate is an honor.

I continue my work on the Senate Armed Services Committee, each year authorizing the funding required to build our military capabilities and ensuring that our service members are trained and equipped to defend our nation. I was pleased to be part of a bipartisan effort to enact a new law to simplify the appeals review process to reduce the backlog our veterans are facing, as well as a new law that provides critical funding to the VA Choice Program, allowing veterans in rural Maine to access services closer to home.

While my committee work is important, working to combat the opioid epidemic is one of my top priorities. Although Congress has made some important strides, much remains to be done to provide additional funding for prevention, treatment and enforcement. I am working with colleagues on both sides of the aisle to pressure the Drug Enforcement Administration to reduce the amount of opioids produced and to thwart the flow of fentanyl and other deadly drugs into our country.

I am very optimistic about the integrated, multiagency effort I led with Senator Collins to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy. Through the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT) we are already experiencing increased federal investments that will strengthen our existing forest products industry and help support job creation in rural communities. Initiatives like Cross Laminated Timber, Combined Heat and Power, nanocellulose, 3D printing with biobased materials and other biobased products will mean that Maine's wood-basket will continue to be a major jobs and economic contributor for our future.

Finally, the coming year will continue the work of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence in the ongoing investigation of Russian interference in the 2016 election. Our Committee has held seven public hearings and numerous classified sessions, reviewed tens of thousands of pages of documents and conducted hundreds of interviews. I remain focused on the security of our elections and committed to developing strategies to prevent interference by foreign governments in our democracy.

May 2018 be a good year for you, your family, your community and our great State.

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to share an update on my work to represent you and your family in Washington and in Maine.

Even though Washington is so bitterly divided these days, I've continued to look for bipartisan opportunities to address issues important to our state. Nearly all the bills I've introduced this Congress have Republican cosponsors.

One piece of legislation would help protect our state's economy by investing in working waterfronts. Another would allow Mainers to import less expensive prescriptions from Canada. And several bills would help our farmers capitalize on the fastest growing areas of agriculture—local and organic sales—by investing in research, increasing consumer access to healthy food, and improving farmer programs.

I'm happy to report bipartisan victories for our veterans as well. After working for years with Maine's Congressional Delegation, we were finally able to push a much-needed expansion of the Portland VA Community Based Outpatient Clinic through Congress. Legislation I introduced to help veterans who find themselves in debt to the Department of Veterans Affairs unanimously passed the House of Representatives. And full GI Bill benefits were extended to a group of veterans who had been denied them previously—an issue I've introduced legislation to address.

While I strive to find common ground with my colleagues on everything from rural broadband access to economic development, there are many areas where I will not compromise. I have serious concerns about direction the Trump Administration and its allies in Congress are taking our country. In so many ways, they have abandoned America's leadership in the world, made our country less safe, and are jeopardizing our future. They've weakened our health care system, rigged the tax code against working families, and endangered the environment. With one hand, they are taking away resources our families and communities need. With the other, they are offering generous giveaways to giant corporations and the wealthiest Americans.

Over the last year, I've received an unprecedented amount of feedback on these issues from my constituents. With their concerns and interests in mind, I have fought hard against these policies. I will continue using my role in Congress and the Appropriations Committee to hold the Administration and the President accountable.

Please keep in touch with your views or if there is anything I might be able to help you with. My office assists hundreds of constituents every year who have issues with federal programs or agencies. It's an honor to serve you.

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to represent you in the Maine Senate. It has been an honor to work on your behalf to make our state an even better place to live, work and conduct business.

On August 2, Maine lawmakers finally adjourned for the year, after what proved to be the longest session in recent memory due to a brief government shut down over budgetary disagreements. While no state budget is ever perfect, the end product was a state budget that makes a record investment in our students, supports our communities and will tremendously benefit small businesses and our economy.

Perhaps the most significant action the Legislature took last year, as part of the biennial budget, was the removal of the burdensome, job-killing surtax that was already hurting small businesses, doctors and other professionals that we so critically need. In November 2016, voters sent a clear message that education funding was to be a priority of the 128th Legislature, and we heard that message loud and clear. However, the funding mechanism which was included in the measure – the surtax – presented a serious threat to the state's economy. This new tax gave Maine the ominous distinction of being the highest-taxed state in the country and primarily impacted small businesses, which are the backbone of our economy, taxing them at a rate that is higher than larger corporations are subject to pay. I am proud to say that after much hard work and negotiating and thanks to our rebounding economy, we were able to support our local schools at a level we have never been able to before – without any additional taxation.

The Homestead Exemption, which provides much-needed property tax relief for homeowners, was also preserved in the budget with an increased exemption of \$20,000.

The Legislature also passed a measure to make Maine compliant with the REAL ID Act. As a result of this important new law, the federal government has granted Maine a waiver, meaning that Maine citizens can continue to use their driver's licenses to board commercial airplanes and access certain federal buildings.

While we accomplished much, there is still a lot of work ahead of us next session. Again, thank you for putting your trust in me to represent you in Augusta. Thanks to sound management, the County continues to provide excellent services to our towns, cities and citizens. We have been able to keep tax increases to cities and towns below two percent despite increases in the rate of inflation and health costs.

The Board of Commissioners continues to support the Contract Deputy program. The Sheriff's Department patrols nine of the twenty-nine towns in the County. Our rural patrol provides the level of protection required by State Statute. If your town decides that a higher level of protection is wanted, the citizens may vote to contract a deputy from the Sheriff's Department. The Maine State Law requires that the county recoup the full cost of the program from the municipalities.

The County Animal Response Team is entering its third successful year with a strong volunteer base of thirty people. The York County team is the largest and most active team in the State.

The County is committed to recognizing community service and held the second Spirit of America awards ceremony in November. The food pantry in conjunction with The York County Shelter is open. This will provide vital services to those who suffer from food insecurity. York County is proud to be a partner in this endeavor.

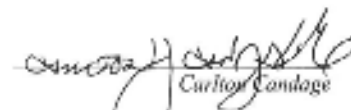

CORNISH WATER DISTRICT – 2017 TOWN REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF CORNISH:

The Cornish Water District is a quasi-municipal non-profit corporation managed by an elected board of five trustees. We supplied 17,325,900 gallons of water during 2017 from both of our pump stations (Northwood Drive and Pavilion Rd). In 2017 we pumped, on average, 47,468 gallons of water on a daily basis. The annual comprehensive test done by the State of Maine laboratory indicated excellent drinking water quality.

In 2017 the Water District worked on/or completed the following:

1. CCR (Consumer Confidence Report) was completed, published and distributed to consumers in July. The MDWP mandates this be done each year.
2. Flushed all hydrants & blow offs.
3. Exercised all system gate valves.
4. Completed quarterly bacteria test required b Maine State Drinking Water Program. (0 contaminates were found).
5. Completed lead and copper samples throughout systems – all within limits.
6. Completed all required water testing- including Nitrates – all within limits.
7. Cleared 4 service line freeze u0s.
8. Installed 4 new water service lines.
9. Repaired 3 service leaks.
10. Repaired and replaced 4 cub stops and curb stop boxes.
11. Installed 20 new meters, replacing outdated meters.
12. Installed 20 winter bleeder systems to prevent freeze ups.
13. Updated the vulnerability assessment and emergency response plan as required.
14. Continued updated the building and security measure in accordance with homeland security and completing fencing around exterior of building and installing security cameras.
15. Wellhead protection completed.
16. Completed necessary training classes to keep our Operator Licenses up to date.
17. Continued enforcement of Cross Connection control Program with annual inspection. Reporting 100% compliance and working backflows.
18. New sump pump at Pavilion Rd.
19. New #2 Caustic pump and pipe work.
20. New Chlorine pump and pipe work for Northwood Drive.
21. Passed sanitary exam given by State of Maine.
22. New roof and insulation fitted to the reservoir building.
23. Purchased new caustic barrel mixing pump.
24. Raised several gate valve boxes for DOT paving project on South Hiram Rd.
25. Installed new section of water main pipe on South Hiram Rd.
26. Updated hydrant flow testing.
27. Repaired damaged hydrant and repainted all hydrants.
28. Updated the water main system map.
29. New 6” water main fitted for Town Hall sprinkler system.
30. New safety equipment for staff.

2017 RECYCLING UPDATE

The Cornish Recycling Center, located on School Street, accepts plastics #1 - #7 (bottles, jugs and tubs), tin and aluminum cans, all paper (junk mail, catalogs and magazines) including paperboard (cereal boxes or cardboard tubes and broken down cardboard boxes), glass bottles and jars.

In 2017 the Cornish Recycling Center collected 46.25 tons (92,500 pounds) of material. This is a decrease from our 2016 recycling rate which was (97,100 pounds).

Per EcoMaine, the 2017 Cornish recycling stream breaks down into the following categories:

EcoMaine explained that there is a difference in the total tons we recycled vs. the breakdown above, due in part to moisture content in the material at the time of acceptance.

The Cornish Recycling Center, located on School Street, accepts rigid plastics #1 to #7 which includes bottles, jugs and tubs, tin and aluminum cans, all paper, such as junk mail, catalogues and magazines, paperboard, such as cereal boxes and/or cardboard tubes as well as all broken down cardboard boxes, also glass bottles and jars.

In 2017, the Cornish Recycling Center collected 47.95 ton (95,900) pound of material. The town's recycling rate is down for the second year in a row, but this trend should correct itself with the reintroduction of the second collection dumpster. Each pound we can recycle is a pound that we don't need to pay to haul and dump as trash, saving the town taxpayer's monies.

To help improve the town's recycling rate, do not mix trash such as bubble wrap, plastic bags, wood or Styrofoam (even if it has a number), into the recycling bins,. Visit www.cornishme.com for recycling details and guidance on how to best recycle items and www.ecomaine.org for more information.

In October, the Cornish Recycling Committee held a Scrap Tire Collection Day for the town residents, 51 households participated and we collected 271 tires. Total weight of the tires was 3.2 tons, (6,400 pounds). Thank you to our hard working volunteers; Jack Bash, Kay Blake, Mat Cama, Joy Chase, Cynthia Mason, Gary Mason, Mike Mellen, Steve Mellen, Jen Otenti, Jean Pendexter and Clif Sargent for coordinating the event and providing boots on the ground.

Let's all do what we can to increase recycling and decrease trash disposal in 2018!

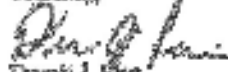

The area of testing that is most relevant to the Town of Corinth is all on the Corinth side of Corinth Station and at the bridge off Bridge Street. Attached you will find our 2017 test results for 2017.

The water quality program was created to help understand the types of issues that affect the quality of the water in the river and to help the Corporation and your neighbors better understand how the various users in the town contribute to their quality of life. There is a direct correlation between the quality of the river and streams in our town and the quality of our region's drinking water. As the community improves and develops and facilities expand, having the monitoring program in place will allow the town and the SRCC to better assess the current and future health of the river. To that end, the Corporation will find the following statement beneficial as an article in your town records:

"The town will vote to offer and appropriate SRCC toward the support of the Seco River Corridor Commission for its continued water quality monitoring program."

We welcome comments, questions or suggestions about the program or about any of the work we do. Our goal is to protect the value of our river and lakes in our area. We will continue to do our part, but we really need the Town's help to succeed.

SACO RIVER CORRIDOR COMMISSION
"Communities Working Together To Protect Our Rivers"

The Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) was created with one purpose in mind – to protect the rivers in the Saco Basin and all that these rivers represent to the people that live and work here. The legislature provided the start and the performance standards to initiate the program and the cleanliness of the river is a testament to that effort. The Commission's role is one of partnership. Each town has an opportunity to choose two people to represent them on the board and in this way, the Commission is functioning more as a local/regional group working to keep the water clean and to keep Maine looking like Maine. It's a fact that many people come to Maine from other places. They arrive wondering how wonderful Maine is, the clean air, the clean water and all the trees which look "nothing like where they are from". Eventually, as these are built up, the values that people taught our change, bringing inappropriate uses to the shore land area that can lead to land and water based problems.

The Town of Cornish is fortunate to have Jennifer Stearns on the Commission. The Member position is currently vacant. Anyone interested in obtaining more information about how to represent your community through this Commission should contact the Commission Staff and we will explain the town's role and the individual's role as well. In a practical sense, Commissioners give the Town of Cornish an opportunity to participate in the present and future development patterns throughout the entire corridor from Fryeburg to Saco. Clean, healthy water is Maine's greatest asset. It's hard to underestimate this important fact.

We are happy to report the conclusion of our seventeen successful Saco River Monitoring Program. Currently, we have over 10 volunteers monitoring for dissolved oxygen, pH, turbidity, temperature, total Kjeldahl nitrogen, total phosphorus, orthophosphate, Alkalinity and Bacteriologic colt. We also do macro invertebrate testing and conductivity testing at many sites within the corridor. Our testing takes place on a bi-weekly schedule along the Saco, Oquossoc, and Little Ossipee Rivers at 35 different locations during the months of May through September. All of the information relating to the past seventeen years of the Commission's monitoring program can be found on our website located at www.saco-metro.org. This information can be useful for Planning Boards, Code Enforcement Officers and developers in identifying appropriate types of land uses close to the River.

The Commission's job is to work with the communities in the Corridor to help keep the rivers clean and healthy. Copies of the water quality monitoring information is available or questions can be asked by calling Dennis, the Commission's Executive Director. As always, if the town or citizen has a place on the river they believe should be tested, we would love to hear about it. The Commission office is located at 81 Maple Street in Cornish, Maine (Telephone 307-625-8123) and can be found on the web at www.saco-metro.org.

Bonney Memorial Library 2017 Report

Bonney Memorial Library has been under construction during much of the 2017 year and will make its grand re-opening on the second of December. Our construction activities have been made possible exclusively by generous donations of community members and many grants awarded to the library specifically for such efforts. As part of the expansion, the Library has become an energy efficient building and serves as a model for others, especially historic buildings, looking to improve their energy footprint. During most the construction the library stayed open and continued its ongoing and special programs serving the area.

During the 2016-2017 fiscal year the Library had 6,765 patrons and loaned out 11,008 items such as books, magazines, audiovisual material, and puzzles. Additionally, 145 books were requested from our library through inter-library loan, and 504 were received by our patrons through this same program. The library purchased 551 books this year, and 223 books, audio CDs, and other items were donated. 1752 patrons used our public computers inside the building.

The expansion has created space for a community meeting room, a new children's room, and the original space is once again a grand reading room. The building is now ADA compliant with new bathrooms, improved entrances, and an elevator.

The board would like to thank Cheryl Hevey for her many years of service to the library. She has shown exceptional grace and guidance through a hectic and demanding time for our library. We would also like to thank the many patrons, and Friends, and residents who helped with this project through in-kind gifts, donations, help, labor, suggestions, and support.

We look forward to serving the Cornish area in the "new" library with expanded programming and community space. The Library's 90th year in operation will be one of its most exciting.

The Cornish Fire Department had another busy year, as we responded to 113 calls for service in 2017. Total calls added up to 619.5 man hours total.

A breakdown of calls is as follows:

We were able to purchase (10) ten sets of Structural Firefighting gear, coats and pants; with a cost roughly of \$1,350.00 per set, with monies raised annually at the Town Meeting, which if taken care of properly should last at least (10) ten years. In, January, this year we had the flooring replaced in the large meeting room at the fire station. The carpeting had a number of stains, that couldn't be cleaned and was replaced with similar tile that is in the other rooms at the station, and is a little different color to help break things up a bit and make it easier to clean.

The department also obtained, from the Department of Defense Surplus Equipment Program, a 35K diesel powered generator that we mounted in a trailer which was obtained from the forest Service Federal Excess Property Program. The department spent roughly \$500.00 to make the generator portable and to meet the town's needs. The cost of that generator, new, is roughly \$26K, not including the trailer.

Also, in 2017, the department upgraded both radio sites, High Road & Hessian Hill, with new batteries and power supplies to give us added time to get a generator to those sites in case of a prolonged power outage. High road has a propane powered generator, but it's not brand new, so the added batteries are just another back-up safety measure.

The department also replaced a control station radio on Ossipee Mountain, in Waterboro, which is part of the State's Emergency radio network, costs of the radio and associated costs were \$5,500.00. I'd like to thank Sam Gilpatrick for all his time and efforts to keep our system up and running and functioning properly for Cornish and the other surrounding town.

This past year we've added (3) three new members to the department, all of which are 30 years of age or younger, of which (2) two are currently enrolled in a Fire Fighter I Course at Westbrook Fire Department.

Once Again, I'd like to thank the members for their continued dedication to the Citizen's of Cornish and the Town Officials for their continued support.

We are writing to request that the article below be included in the warrant for the next town meeting (2018) and request 100% of franchise fees received from TWC-SPECTRUM. First and foremost we truly appreciate the continued support of the Tv2 High School program. This year has been an exciting and refreshing one for the student managed Tv2 program. We continue to add an increasing amount of updated programming for our viewers across the MBLADES community. We have continued to provide programming to those not served by TWC-SPECTRUM by use of streaming web media content. Our UPTOWN side allows viewers who do not have access to Tv2 on their televisions to view the same content online simultaneously. By simply going to our website www.svhs.tv2.org and clicking on the "Live Now Click Here" anyone can view our live programming 24/7. We have allowed our Tv2 radio programming live stream on our school's programming. Again this year, SVHS students continue to work particularly hard setting up live sound and live camera broadcasting from the many school based public forums that took place during the school budget process, as well as other community and school events. Right now the number of live events on Tv2 is over 30 events for this year. This is including the 12 MBLADES School Board Meetings, boys and girls home sporting events, the MBLADES School Budget and other events as well. We continue to provide coverage of all school board meetings and were able to record and broadcast all of the town meetings. Every day at 7am and 7pm we replay the entire MBLADES School Board Meeting from the past month so viewers can catch up if they missed the event. Our schedule is always posted in our bulletin board on Tv2. We also broadcast some town events during the past year and will continue to increase the amount of events we cover in the towns that support Tv2. We made it a class goal of covering more town events in the year 2018.

Tv2 students continue to work in a classroom format perfecting their skills with producing school and community events, and updating information on our bulletin board for viewers. Students actively engage in learning valuable real life TV/Video experiences as they develop skills necessary to manage the public sphere through, all while while broadcasting "on-the-air". We are very proud to provide coverage and look to always improve on the program. Many students benefit from this educational opportunity created by the Tv2 Community Television Program at the school, several of which have pursued careers in this field after graduation. For some students in the program, it is their first time broadcasting events and quickly learn the skills required for the job.

In 2018, we will continue to see the results of our franchise agreement negotiations. The great funds we received last year have enhanced the ability to provide HD broadcasting signals, audio enhancements, bringing old equipment to current up to date, provide a much clearer signal and more access to web capabilities, all things that have previously been a struggle. The equipment grants have placed the Tv2 station in line with the infrastructure to enhance our current operations. We look forward to continuing to reach more viewers, provide more event coverage and further expand on our current broadcasting service. As previously mentioned, our class goal is to provide more events in 2018 for all 5 towns.

This article does not require the town to make any payments. The franchise fee is a fee paid by each cable subscriber to TVFC-SPECTRUM - above and beyond the regular cable rate - and is returned to the town. Many municipalities dedicate these fees to the local access studios, in our case Tv2. It is our goal to have Tv2 be self-sufficient, and not need to use school funds or request donations from local businesses to maintain operations.

All funds for Tv2 are managed through the PELHAM #23 Finance Office and are audited every year with records kept for at least seven years.

This year Sacopee Rescue responded to 775 patients. This is a record number for our service. Even though we have answered a record number of calls there are still calls we are unable to respond to because our ambulance and crew are on another call. When that happens one of our neighboring ambulance services comes in to respond. In the coming year we will be exploring ways that we can answer more of those calls.

In August we had another successful yard sale. We updated some of our smaller equipment with the money earned. In several of our meetings we discussed other fund raising events, from having a golf tournament to a barbecue competition. Watch the shopping guide for those and possible other events.

We replaced a 12 year old defibrillator with a new Zoll defibrillator this year at the cost of \$28,000.00. We have 2 more defibrillators that are 10 years old. Our plan is to cycle those out, one at a time, over the next 5 years. Even though the 2 remaining defibrillators are 10 years old we have them maintained every 6 months to keep them in perfect working order. We also have updated all our fluorescent light fixtures in the station with LED fixtures. We should see a cost savings over the next year. Beverly Russell representative from Hiram is looking into grants for vehicles & equipment to try to reduce our expenses.

We are in need of at least one new board member to represent each town, if you have an interest contact your town office. As always we appreciate and are thankful for the support from the citizen of the area.
